Happy (season of) Easter, saints of Flushing! And may I greet you all with a very hearty Χριστός ἀνέστη

That is to say, "Christos anesti" which means "Christ is risen!"

Blessed are you, those who have not seen or perceived the risen Christ, but yet have come to believe. I think about this dynamic a lot within the Christian faith – as time's arrow marches forward, we grow further and further away from the historic event of Jesus' crucifixion and resurrection. It was an event that happened to other people in a far away land, thousands of years ago. And yet, it still holds monumental importance to us. I also think of this phrase and its ubiquity; it is uttered the entire world over on the day we celebrate Jesus' rising from the grave.

The phrase "Christ is risen" likely exists as a shortened version of Matthew 28:5-6, as seen below:

⁵ The angel said to the women, "Do not be afraid, for I know that you are looking for Jesus, who was crucified. ⁶ He is not here; **he has risen**, just as he said. Come and see the place where he lay.

Okay, that explains the initial "call" portion of the greeting. But where does the response come from? Well, there are a couple theories on that, the first of which is that Mary Magdalene brought an egg in greeting the Roman Emperor Tiberius. She spoke the greeting "Christ is risen" and he mocked her in reply, claiming that Christ was no more risen than the egg in her hand was red. Tradition states that the egg in her hand immediately turned red to illustrate the truth of her claim. Interestingly, this is also one of the stories by which we get the origin of the Easter egg!

Another theory of the origin states that the greeting comes from Luke 24:33-34, printed below:

³³ They got up and returned at once to Jerusalem. There they found the Eleven and those with them, assembled together ³⁴ and saying, "It is true! The Lord has risen and has appeared to Simon."

Regardless of the origin of the greeting, here we are today. It is a triumphant claim, one whose words echo down through the years, centuries, and through the millennia. Perhaps that's the best way we can think of the Easter Acclamation – our faith's longest call and response song. The leader speaks or sings one line, the assembled chorus then chants the response. After all, we talk about joining in the song of all those who have run the race in their own faith before us. Think of the words of the communion table, where "we join our voices with prophets, apostles, and martyrs."



Sharing the Load

In 1969 the Hollies released "He Ain't Heavy, He's My Brother." Do you know the story behind that song title? Fifty years earlier in Omaha, Nebraska, a boy with polio was abandoned at Father Flanagan's Home for Boys, predecessor to the Boys Town organization. Soon several older residents started carrying young Howard — with his heavy leg braces — especially up stairs. Father Flanagan once saw an older boy, Reuben, doing this and asked if it was hard work. Reuben replied, "He ain't heavy, Father. He's my brother." Years later, these words and the image of one person carrying another became the Boys Town brand.

All of us have been "carried" at some point, and we've likely "carried" someone else. The Hollies' song declares: "His welfare is my concern." Jesus said it this way: "Love your neighbor as yourself." The load isn't too heavy to bear because Jesus himself is always carrying us.
