Summer Reading

I'm not sure how many of you know this about me, but growing up my mom worked the desk at the local library. Because of this, she switched my bus stop to the corner outside her workplace and I would stay with her until the end of her shift. Mom taught me how to read and read *voraciously*. One of my first true passions was smoking everyone in the reading contest the local branch held every single summer. It's been said that the summer season is tailor-made for nostalgia; you always remember how you passed the time growing up, when you had the luxury of a seeming unending leisure time. You could feel the blades of grass between your toes, catch fireflies in your hands after the sun's fading light had passed in the growing-shorter days, feel the sticky-sweet ice cream dripping into the cracks of fingers holding onto a waffle cone. But for me, summers were about *reading*.

I'm sure many of you can relate! Who among us hasn't grabbed a book to read over the course of a long vacation trip by car or plane? Who hasn't stuffed a paperback into the bottom of their beach bag, to be defaced and weathered with saltwater drippings and coarse grains of sand? Reading is ingrained into the fabric of our being, a skill we learn when we're small and retain for life. It's also one that's especially pertinent to us as Christians! After all, one of the colloquial terms for people who practice our faith is "people of the book." Did you know that our word "Bible" – one that we take for granted and toss around all the time in our study groups and worship services – comes to us from the Greek word *biblion*, meaning...you guessed it! "Book"!

So, because I'm excited about what I'm reading at the moment, I wanted to share with you my summer reading projects. I've got three books going at the same time, and they're each listed with a short description below:

• Hope: a user's manual

MaryAnn McKibben Dana explores the spiritual nature of hope. With short chapters, this one can be read in bite-sized pieces and serves as a thoughtful, beautiful reflection of the enduring and persevering aspect of human resilience. She reflects on what hope is *not*, outlining the many cheap substitutes culture peddles to us. If you're looking for a good devotional book, this is the one for you.

- I Was Hungry: Cultivating Common Ground to End an American Crisis
 - Jeremy K Everett is the founder and executive director of the Texas Hunger Institute, an organization that seeks to consolidate the various faith and community-based organizations in TX to "develop and implement strategies to alleviate hunger." This book details his story in founding THI and takes a non-partisan approach to the subject of pervasive hunger and systemic poverty. If you are interested in our church's participation in Matthew 25, this is the one for you.
- Post-Traumatic Jesus: a Healing Gospel for the Wounded

David W. Peters, a veteran of the war in Iraq and a former army chaplain, explores the gospel story of Jesus through the lens of trauma – emotional, physical, and mental – and delves into what it means for God to heal us of our wounds. This looks into the still-relevant power the good news has in the wake of global turmoil such as 9/11, the wars in the middle east, the Ukraine conflict, and covid-19. If you're interested in looking at such events and you wonder "where is God in the midst of trouble?" then this is the book for you.

BEING GOOD SPORTS

When gestures of sportsmanship go viral, they often feature young athletes. In 2022, a Little League baseball player who took a pitch to the head later hugged the distraught opposing pitcher. Evangelist Ken Weliever says pro athletes, politicians, media personalities and everyday Americans should follow that example rather than focusing on revenge.

"Sadder still is when entire churches are disrupted by petty squabbles, partisan politics and overzealous opinions," he writes. "Relationships have been ruptured, marriages dissolved and families torn apart due to a harsh response to hurts instead of a spirit of forgiveness and an attitude of reconciliation."

Christians may sometimes feel tempted to seek payback, but Jesus calls us to live differently. "We need to be reminded that we are to be a transformed people, not conformed to the attitudes and actions of this world (Romans 12:1-2)," says Weliever. "To be light in a world of darkness. 
