# March 2023 Newsletter

March is upon us, friends. There are *many* reasons why this is your pastor's favorite month of the year. I was born in March, the vernal equinox takes place and marks the time of spring as we come in like a lion and go out like a lamb...and of course, there is also St. Patrick's Day. Now, I don't usually partake of corned beef and cabbage like many of my ancestors; I never developed a taste for it. I'm not particularly a fan of dyeing a beer green. Sometimes I'll do something fun like make Rowan green eggs and ham, but those days have become increasingly spare as he's become more and more picky about food. The tradition I cling to, however, is searching for a four-leaf clover.

Four-leaf clovers are associated with luck because, as is oft-cited, finding one on the first try is usually 1 in 10,000 odds, or 0.01%. Some sources vary on this detail and claim that the odds of finding a clover with four leaves is in fact 1 in 5,000, or 0.02%. Either way, finding a four-leaf clover is very, very rare. It's also commonly confused with a shamrock, but the two things aren't the same. Our English word "shamrock" comes from the Irish "*Seamog*" or "*Seamair Og*" meaning "young clover." And the three leaves of the shamrock are what Saint Patrick used to explain the concept of the Holy Trinity to the pagan Irish in the 5<sup>th</sup> century.

I think there's a world of difference between these two concepts. We often bid people "good luck" without thinking anything of it because well, it's a common English idiomatic phrase. But what is luck, really? Luck is fortune, a random event or series of events that befall us. And if we claim that God is sovereign, and that all good things come from above (according to the short James quotation at the top of this page) then really, our modern sense of luck has no room in how we view the world. One of my favorite characters in all of fiction, the wizened Obi-Wan Kenobi, says "In my experience there's no such thing as luck." He relies on a power greater than himself and to him, there's no such thing as accident or coincidence. No such thing as luck.

I've seen some people use the word "Godspeed" in place of "good luck" because "Godspeed" carries with it the same emotion of "may you prosper on your way" but there's an element of the Divine to it. The word is a little archaic and out of use, sure. But much of language is cyclical, with words going out of style and eventually making their way back into popular use. But make no mistake:

> God works through all things and in all things, with nothing random. On God's green earth, friends, nothing is left to chance.


